s the legendary birthplace of Aphrodite, the Goddess of love, the island of Cyprus has many connotations with the divine nature of beauty and desire, not least when it comes to its stunning natural heritage. Harnensing the potential offered by this unique resource, the island's modern and exhilarating golfing greens, often envelope Cyprus' natural features, making this one of the most impressive emerging golfing destinations in the Mediterranean.

Named after the Goddess of love herself, Aphrodite Hills Golf Club has become famed as a world-class venue, offering the pinnacle of challenges, including a dramatic gorge running through the course. Eléa Golf Club has proven to be a new star for the island, originating from the tactically unique conception of Sir Nick Faldo.

Minthis Hills is well-known for its unique, undulating terrain, as well as narrow fairways, while Secret Valley summons precision and skill to navigate around the course.

In line with the Strategic Tourism Plan of Cyprus, golfing tourism is an ongoing development, which seeks to continuously improve the island's offering to the game's enthusiasts as well as promote the sport as a fulfilling and challenging pastime. Each course provides an academy and top-quality facilities for golfers wishing to train and improve their game, with club Pros at hand to teach new skills. Exclusive lessons for juniors as well as beginners are available.

Already a booming tourist destination with year-round sunshine, Cyprus is the new jewel in Europe for golfers seeking breaks in the warmth of the eastern Mediterranean. It boasts the longest golf playing season compared to all other popular destinations in Europe.

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yprus comprises a choice of four international standard 18-hole golf courses, all located in the Pafos region, in the southwest of the island, where gently sloping hills, tranquility and panoramic views of the Mediterranean Sea are in abundance.

Although the development of golf tourism is fairly new in Cyprus, Aphrodite Hills, Eléa, Minthis Hills and Secret Valley Golf Clubs are bringing the sector closer to world-wide recognition. Strict golfing procedures are met, with all golf courses in Cyprus having been slope rated according to the USGA/ EGA slope rating system and all Cyprus Golf Federation member clubs adhering to and using the EGA handicap system.

The Cyprus Tourism Organisation participates in Golf Travel Markets and Fairs and organises familiarisation visits for golf journalists, Pros and tour operators. The Organisation supports Golf PR Events abroad, and international Golf tournaments on the island, such as the Cyprus Amateur Open Championships, which attract more than 100 golfers from 16 countries each year. Cyprus successfully hosted the PGA EuroPro Tour Final Championship 2010, the Aegean Airlines Pro-Am 2012 and the EGA Men's Club Trophy 2012 signifing the island's established popularity.

Whether practising at an amateur level or challenging your handicap by participating in one of island's Golf Open Tournaments, you will be experiencing enjoyment and challenge at any of the courses on the island, while new developments in the pipeline promise yet more worldclass courses, offering new landscapes, scenery and testing shots.

Aphrodite Hills Golf Club

Situated on verdant meandering hills, overlooking the place where Aphrodite is said to have emerged from the waves, Aphrodite Hills Golf Club offers a tranquil setting, as well as a unique challenge, with its spacious fairways cutting through lakes and enveloping olive and carob trees.

The distinctive landscape is unrelenting, providing tests for golfers of all abilities, with a real skill required to conquer the holes that run alongside or traverse the dramatic central ravine. This striking deep canyon separates two plateaux and makes the course truly unique, with the descent down to the seventh tee presenting an adventure in itself. The back tee on the third looks forever over the gorge and presents a thrilling shot, while the eighth and 15th provide exquisite views. Voted in the Top-20 Most Popular Courses in Europe 2011, it is no wonder that the course has become famed as one of the best in the Mediterranean.

Cabell Robinson, course designer, elaborated on the range of challenges presented. "*Personally I think reaching for the back pin position on the 12th needs the most courage, while the 16th is my pick for the toughest par 4, and the 18th is a reachable and wonderful par 5.*"

The golf is part of an integrated resort, which features an InterContinental Hotel, offering five-star luxury, bars and restaurants, a Greco-Roman award winning Spa, a Tennis Academy with multi-surface courts, a Horse Riding Club, as well as nature and bike trails.

Clubhouse

At the end of a satisfying day, golfers can celebrate their success in the sophisticated Clubhouse and large terraces, overlooking the 18th green, set in natural and stunning surroundings. Here, one can savour Cypriot specialties, international cuisine, or just take pleasure in the breathtaking view.

The Aphrodite Hills Golf Academy features first class practice facilities, including a large double-ended driving range with targets and distance markers. Other resources include pitching and chipping greens with bunkers, a generously sized putting green and a challenging three-hole course, consisting of two par 4s and a par 3. A wide range of programmes are offered under the expert tutelage of experienced PGA qualified golf professionals, with access to the latest training technology, including the state-of-the-art gasp system for swing analysis.

Sir Nick Faldo: "What I've always respected more than anything else is a design that requires a certain amount of strategic interaction, a course that will pose challenges and ask questions of a player. Of course, we also want our golf to be played in a natural environment that fits perfectly with its surroundings – perhaps even enhance them. These are the principles that have driven our design at the Eléa Golf Club."

Minthis Hills

t an altitude of 550m above sea level, tucked away in a valley surrounded by vineyards and orchards and encircling a 12th century monastery, the golf course at Minthis Hills has been carefully integrated into the landscape. It is a course for all seasons, enjoying cool breezes even during the summer, and having opened in 1994, it is the first course in Cyprus.

Originally designed by golf course architect Donald Steel, with extensive enhancements carried out by MacKenzie & Ebert, the course is easily walkable if so desired, whilst panoramic views of the striking Troodos range, the region of Pafos and the sparkling Mediterranean Sea can be enjoyed.

Fit for all abilities, Minthis Hills features elevated tees as well as more enthralling challenges from narrow, tree-lined fairways, where careful thought, skill and precision are required. The short par four 12th hole is an example of the course's unique trials, where the green can be reached with a well struck drive, although a threatening steep valley cascades along the left side, shaping each move. Conversely, the 14th & 17th holes are challenging uphill par fours requiring accuracy and distance to reach the green in two, and the new 13th hole provides an excellent crescendo to a set of good par threes, with water surrounding the green. To top it off it is a looped course, with each nine returning you to the clubhouse, perfect for halfway refreshments.

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Clubhouse

Minthis Hills Clubhouse blends traditional Mediterranean architecture with a distinctive contemporary style. It provides a cocktail bar, lounge and sun terrace and conference facilities, a business centre and changing facilities. The Clubhouse restaurants offer attentive service and striking views.

Secret Valley



Romiou, the place where legend says Aphrodite the Goddess of love was born, Secret Valley Golf Course is quite often a preferred choice on the island for its stunning setting, friendly and relaxed atmosphere, as well as sheer playability.

With trees providing shade as well as obstacles, and striking natural rock formations draped across the estate, there are numerous challenges to be faced when playing the course.

Secret Valley is the second 18-hole golf course developed in Cyprus and has become a favourite among golfers in terms of playability and enjoyment.

The course has a rural and isolated feel, in the midst of natural Cypriot countryside, making it the perfect place to unwind.

Tradition, history and elevated views of the sea accompany an enjoyable golfing experience to make this an attractive destination for enthusiasts of the sport.

Secret Valley will become part of a two 18-hole golf project, designed by famous golfer Tony Jacklin, four times Ryder Cup Captain and winner of the British Open and US Open.

It is an island of contrasts – travelling across the island's changing landscapes, you will pass through cosmopolitan resorts, picturesque countryside, hilltop winemaking villages through the Wine Routes, to coastline towns, all within easy reach.

The capital city of Lefkosia is steeped in history while Larnaka, Lemesos and Pafos also have much to offer tourists, including a plethora of events and cultural exhibits as well as attractive beaches amid the bustling city lifestyle.

In addition to an expanding golfing scene, with prestigious courses that are transforming Cyprus's tourism and adding to its conference and incentives offering, the island possesses the ideal landscape and features for enthusiasts of hiking, cycling and watersports, among other sports. Discover the wonders of the underwater world by snorkeling or diving in the warm crystal clear sea, admiring sealife or exploring the Zenovia shipwreck, one of the ten most popular worldwide, close to Larnaka.

Windsurfing and sailing can be enjoyed all-year-round, thanks to steady winds and calm, predictable seas. Coastal cruising and deep-water fishing are also popular.

For a more adrenaline-filled experience, rock climbing can be enjoyed throughout the island, including sport routes on the hard limestone crag by the Dhiarizos river and on an elevated sandstone crag in the Akamas peninsula, with amazing views of Lara beach.

Hiking is an ideal way to experience the culture and nature of the island. Cyprus has numerous sign-posted nature trails which are a feast for the senses, especially during springtime when you can experience the sights, sounds and smells of nature at first hand. The Troodos Mountain hiking trails traverse scented pine-forests, past waterfalls and take in magnificent panoramic views across the island. Hiking can also be enjoyed in the Akamas Peninsula, an area of natural wilderness where pine-clad cliffs plunge down into turquoise waters. With its rugged coastline, alternating between rocky shores, promontories and sandy bays, it is an area of breathtaking beauty.

The European long distance path, E4, with a length of 537km, which starts in Gibraltar and ends in Cyprus, is popular among European ramblers. It begins at Pafos International Airport and takes hikers along coastal areas, the picturesque countryside and the mountains, and ends at Larnaka International Airport.

Cycling, like everything else on Aphrodite's island, is a love experience. A network of cycling routes throughout the island, including scenic coastal routes and the Troodos Cycling Network with its 14 sign-posted viewpoints, offer cyclists gratifying experiences that stimulate the senses and nourish the spirit.
